

Another award that I highly commend is the Sharjah Excellence Award. With a vision to promote sustainable economic growth in Sharjah by recognising achievements in businesses, this Award is applicable for Large, Small and Medium organisations in the GCC Countries Private Sector. It follows the Excellence Model of the European Foundation for Quality Management (EFQM), and aims to promote a culture of quality, excellence and innovation in all institutions in the business sector. I was delighted to be one of the jury members of this award.

In February, we supported our sister organisation, the Emirates Environmental Group to conduct the 1st panel discussion of the year. The topic of the event was "Greening the Concrete Jungles: Towards Urban Afforestation and Vertical Farming". Even though cities occupy only 3% of the Earth's surface, they currently consume 78% of the total energy used in the world. They are also responsible for 70% of global greenhouse gas emissions. Therefore, urban spaces are an important starting point to make changes with a positive impact not only on their populations but also in the fight against global warming. It was extremely important to understand the issue of urban afforestation and vertical farming in our efforts to address climate change.

The panel discussion invited speakers such as Mr. Henrique Pereira - Chief Executive Officer at Taka Solutions; Dr. Moohammed Wasim Yahia - Assistant Professor at the Architecture Engineering Department of the University of Sharjah; and Ms. Olivia Nielsen - Associate Principal at Miyamoto International.

The speakers answered very interesting and important questions such as the feasibility to implement urban afforestation in the current urban scenario, the impact of vertical farms to prevent encroachment into animal habitats, and the challenges and opportunities in the UAE to establish vertical farms.

Also in February, I attended the public briefing of the Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF) on Financing for Development on the Global Economic Context. Organised by United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA), the session focused on how the global economic recovery is set to decelerate amid continued COVID-19 flare-ups and diminished policy support. According to current forecasts, half of the world's economies will exceed pre-pandemic levels of output by at least 7% in 2023.

The UNDESA session highlighted the importance of practicing sustainability at the corporate and government level. Public briefing of the Inter-agency Task Force on Financing for Development on the Global Economic Context

ACSRN Founder, President & CEO attended on **9th February** the public briefing of the Inter-agency Task Force on Financing for Development on the Global Economic Context organised by UNDESA. The Director, Financing for Sustainable Development Office, UNDESA opened the session with a welcome note and a brief update on the 2022 financing for Sustainable Development Report. It was then followed by presentations and moderated discussions on the global economic context from the: 1) Division Chief, World Economic Studies Division, IMF; 2) Lead Economist, Development Prospects Group, World Bank, and; 3) Chief of Branch, Global Economic Monitoring, Economic Analysis and Policy Division, UNDESA. The session was moderated by Chief of Branch, Policy Analysis & Development, Financing for Sustainable Development Office, UNDESA.

The global recovery is set to decelerate amid continued COVID-19 flare-ups and diminished policy support. According to current forecasts, half of the world's economies will exceed pre-pandemic levels of output by at least 7% in 2023. In East Asia and South Asia, average gross domestic product (GDP) in 2023 is projected to be 18.4% above its 2019 level, compared to only 3.4% in Latin America and the Caribbean. Despite a robust recovery, East Asia and South Asia's GDP in 2023 is projected to remain 1.7% below the levels forecast prior to the pandemic. Africa and Latin America and the Caribbean are projected to see gaps of 5.5 and 4.2% respectively, compared to pre-pandemic projections. These persistent output gaps will exacerbate poverty and inequality and undermine sustainable development. (World Economic Situation and Prospects, 2022)

The outlook is clouded by various downside risks, including new virus variants, unanchored inflation expectations, and financial stress. If some countries eventually require debt restructuring, the recovery will be more difficult to achieve than in the past. Climate change may increase commodity price instability. Social tensions may heighten as a result of the increase in inequality caused by the pandemic. These challenges underscore the need to foster widespread vaccination, enhance debt sustainability, tackle climate change and inequality, and diversify economic activity.

1st Panel Discussion


Over time, while we built many unimaginable constructs to live, travel and survive safely and comfortably; but in our negligence and perhaps arrogance ignore the aspects of the natural environment that allows us to evolve and adapt. It might seem quaint to live in this concrete jungle that we call home, but it is not the best path towards the future. To ascertain questions like how feasible is it to implement urban afforestation to the current urban scenario? Are climate controlled vertical farms a solution to food security in areas where crops are difficult to cultivate? What kinds of barriers currently prevail in terms of making the country food secure and sustainable? ACSRN along with EEG hosted the 1st panel discussion of the year 2022 on **22**nd **February** under the title **"Greening the Concrete Jungles: Towards Urban Afforestation and Vertical Farming".**

The speakers in the panel discussion emphasised that urban afforestation and vertical farms can be considered as a link between existing green urban areas, counter-fragmentation, enhancing environmental cohesion, to cope with the changing climate, gradual environmental degradation and the associated loss of agricultural land. The speakers stressed that urban afforestation and vertical farms not only constitute a base for food production, they can also create a valuable new ecological, social and economic hub in contemporary cities that have been transformed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The distinguished panellists on this Panel Discussion were:

- Ms. Olivia Nielsen Associate Principal at Miyamoto International highlighted some affordable solutions for a green urban future.
- **Dr. Moohammed Wasim Yahia** Assistant professor at Architecture Engineering Department, Faculty of Engineering, and University of Sharjah shared in-depth advantages of urban afforestation
- Mr. Henrique Pereira Chief Executive Officer, Taka Solutions explained the audience with the correlation between urban afforestation and energy consumption.

The Panel Discussion effectively contributed to several Sustainable Development Goals: 3 – Good Health and Well Being, 6: Clean Water and Sanitation 11 – Sustainable Cities and Communities, 13 – Climate Action 14 – Life Below Water & 15 – Life on Land and 17 - Partnership for Goals. The panel was a prime example of the aims to achieve the goals by 2030.

"Investopia" signs MoU with Accenture Middle East

"Investopia" summit signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Accenture Middle East to benefit from the company's expertise in the field of advanced technology, as part of its preparations for the upcoming summit. The summit, set to be held on March 28, 2022 alongside Expo 2020 Dubai, is one of the major strategic initiatives under the 'Projects of the 50' announced by the UAE Government last year.

The agreement was signed by H.E. Abdullah Ahmad Al Saleh, Undersecretary of the Ministry of Economy, and in the presence of H.E. Abdulla Bin Touq Al Marri, Minister of Economy; and Alexis Lecanuet, Accenture's Regional Managing Director in the Middle East.

Under the terms of the MoU, Accenture will serve as a knowledge partner for the Investopia summit, whereby the Ministry and the company will collaborate to facilitate knowledge and experience exchange in the fields of artificial intelligence (AI) and Blockchain, Fintech, Metaverse and quantum computing through the Summit's platform.

During the MoU signing ceremony, H.E. Bin Touq noted that the integration of efforts between the public and private sector has been a constant area of focus in supporting the UAE's transition into an economy based on knowledge and innovation.

Climate Change is a Global Challenge that Requires a Global Perspective

The race to solve climate change is a race to develop new affordable technologies that allow us to move away from fossil fuels.

Like the struggle to contain the worldwide spread of a lethal virus, the task of slowing the inadvertent but substantial alteration of our climate faces higher hurdles because any long-term solution to the problem requires cooperation between nations in vastly different situations. But there is an upside to the international dimension of the climate puzzle. The contributions of diverse countries worldwide working toward solutions offer greater chances for success than if each one was going it alone.

The race to solve climate change is, at its core, a race to develop new affordable technologies that allow us to move briskly away from traditional fossil fuels. It is better to have many countries working on advancing technology than just one. The history of making photovoltaic cells illustrates the value of multiple countries working to increase efficiencies and lower costs. When technical knowledge is transferred to other countries, that's a good form of leakage. Patents and tariffs slow down technology transfer, but scientific information finds it easy to cross national borders.



We can cut global emissions by slashing the demand for fossil fuels. Most reductions in consumption will not pop up somewhere else in the world. Thus, with declining use, we avoid the leakage problem and achieve enduring results in protecting the earth's natural environment. For example, the United States has already made some progress in reducing oil demand with mandates for more fuel-efficient vehicles. Other countries have done likewise, with high gasoline taxes and other policy levers. But, unfortunately, these efforts, so far, have been too sporadic and too riddled with loopholes to effectively combat global climate change.
